

President's Message: "A Quilter's Eye"

I've just returned from a two and a half week trip to the west coast to welcome my newest grandson, and I was reminded once again that we who quilt probably have a different view of our world than non-quilters do. As I accompanied the twenty month old "big sister" to the very busy playground every day, I found myself examining the mosaics that decorated benches all around the park. I was looking for new themes to incorporate into my quilts. The trees and flowers (yes, flowers bloom in southern California in February) that dotted these little urban oases became items to study so that they might be included in my next pictorial project. Decorative tiles on floors and walls offered inspirations for traditional quilt blocks.

As I delivered my latest crib quilt, I naturally began thinking about the four other crib quilts I had happily stitched for my previous "grand's." Now I'm trying to complete the "big bed" quilts for my older grandkids. These are fun because each is the result of many hours of collaboration with the lucky child. This is a great way to share special moments with the youngest of my family. I learn all about their interests and their dreams while in the back of my mind is the thought that perhaps someday these coverings will be handed down, in turn, to the next generation. Perhaps the recipient will be the person in the next generation to continue the quilting tradition.

I find that I even look at my daily surroundings in a different way. I can no longer drive by southern Rhode Island woods without examining the various layers of growth from the rotting derelicts on the forest floor to the half-dead leaves that cling to stunted bushes throughout the winter. Everywhere I go I seem to find patterns. We're surrounded!

As a quilter I often wonder what my legacy will be. To me the best legacy is not the beautiful heirloom quilts that I've attempted to make, but the tattered crib quilt that has been worn out from loving and washing.

I vividly remember my older sister's lamentation as she lay in a hospital bed at the end of her life. She said she had not completed her legacy...she had four quilt tops that she had been unable to complete. One of my last vows to her was that I would see them completed and would give one to each of her four children.

I believe that we quilters are a special group with a unique perspective. I'm often thinking about the bridge that quilting provides from generation to generation. I feel joined to the dedicated stitchers who worked by hand and in candlelight 250 years ago stitching a warm blanket with whatever fabrics were at hand. There's a connection to the depression era homemaker using feed sacks to create something beautiful. Think of the contemporary quilters who are now using fabrics in unusual ways, stretching the definition of a quilt. Last month's pot-luck supper afforded me the chance to look out over our membership as each of us waited our turn to fill our plates and I was struck by the wide spread of ages and backgrounds represented in the room.

Our love of quilting has brought us together to continue the tradition of generations of women sharing and helping. We all have the eye of the quilter.

Newcomer's Corner



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

Thoughts on the Collaboration of Piecers & Longarm Quilters

This August 2008 letter to IMQA earned NBQA member, Pat Ferguson, a position as regular contributor to "ON TRACK!" magazine and is printed with their permission. "ON TRACK!" is the official magazine of the "International Machine Quilters Association" (IMQA), a worldwide organization whose goal is to further the development and education of private and professional machine quilters by providing a network of support and information, visit www.IMQA.org

IMQA: In regard to the query about quilt top piecers and longarm quilters jointly entering a quilt in a show, here are some of my thoughts as a longarm quilter and teacher:

I have been machine quilting and teaching since 1985 and after making and completing countless quilts, I see the completion of a quilt as the work of 3 separate entities: (1) The design of pattern and choice of fabric. (2) The workmanship and skill of piecing the top and (3) The adeptness of designing the appropriate final quilting and edge finishing. These three entities can be completed by one, two or three individuals- this is why I feel that quilt show scoring needs to be broken down into these 3 entities; they are symbiotic and a quilt cannot be completed if one entity is omitted.

Which came first- the chicken or the egg? If the quilt top were not made, the longarm quilter would not have that particular piece to add her expertise to. If the longarm quilter did not add her expertise to the quilt top, it would never have been accepted in a show as just a top. Either way, neither can stand alone in a quilt show- with the exception of wholecloth quilt tops. A joint effort is being made and both parties must be acknowledged. Many quilt top piecers totally leave the quilting design up to the longarm quilter who then uses her design expertise to coordinate the quilting with the patchwork. On the other hand, many quilt top piecers have an idea of how they want their top quilted and the work truly becomes a collaborative effort. Having an idea and being able to execute it are 2 different things- skill and perseverance allows an idea to become a reality which is where the longarm quilter steps in and definitely needs to be credited along with the top owner.

Another thought to consider- the appraisal value of a quilt can be significantly increased if quilted by a published or prize winning longarm quilter. I have been a victim of "loss of credit" - seeing a quilt, that I have longarm quilted, win a ribbon in a show or published in a magazine, without receiving any acknowledgement from the quilt "topper." I can't describe the sinking feeling of disregard, disappointment and ungraciousness in this loss of credit. My impression is that some quilt "toppers" feel that if they pay the longarm quilter, that is all they are obligated to do as they now "own" the quilt. If you made a beautiful frame and then purchased a piece of artwork to place in it, would you take credit for the artwork just because you framed it? The quilting world needs to educate quilt "toppers" to appreciate the

TLC that the longarm quilter puts into their top. As a longarm quilter, I have squared tops, tamed wavy borders, repaired open seams and carefully bound many tops to make them flat, square and finished.

Don't get me wrong- thankfully, there are more "toppers" who do acknowledge their longarm quilter than don't. Truly, it does not take much effort to do so and can make the both parties feel so wonderful. What better gift to give a person than a sense of being appreciated and acknowledged?

I wonder- does this become more of a problem when the temptation of prize money is involved? Does the quilt top owner believe that the longarm quilter has already been paid or does she share the prize money with the longarm quilter who did 1/3 of the total design on the quilt? (remember- pattern design, top workmanship, longarm quilting expertise). As a matter of etiquette, I would hope that the quilt owner would share in the glory and recognition.

Longarm quilting is here to stay. Most quilt shows that I now attend list both the quilt owner and the professional quilter in the program. Longarm quilters, quilting publications, quilt teachers, and all quilters have a responsibility to educate each other in the proper etiquette of acknowledgement and recognition. We are all here to keep the art of quilting alive by sharing and passing on the knowledge.

As a quilt top piecer remembers every piece of fabric in her stash, a longarm quilter remembers every quilt top she has put her personal style into. When quilting that top, we see every square inch of fabric, every design element and every stitch put into that particular quilt. Longarm quilting is here to stay- I believe there needs to be a separate category for these collaborative effort quilts.

p.s. – I believe the next big issue will become digitized longarm quilting vs. free hand long arm quilting

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The *******Quilt******* Judge Is In . . .

Since we can't all have done everything, how do you judge a quilt with a design or technique you yourself have never tried? How do you recognize problems well solved, sometimes brilliantly solved, if you have never had those problems? (I am assuming that the flaws are easier to see.)

Successfully attaining the NQA certified judge designation means that the individual has gone through a rigorous process of researching the entire quilting process. To maintain the NQACJ credential, constant updating of knowledge, quilt show and exhibit attendance, and additional research is required. When a new technique is developed and judged for the first time, it is judged on the current knowledge base of the judge. For example, our October 2009 workshop leader and lecturer, Sherry Rogers-Harrison recently developed her technique "Inklique". The first major show judging it received was at the 2008 AQS show in Paducah. As it was obviously a surface design technique, it was judged on those quality criteria; is medium in situ?, is medium consistently and evenly applied?, is there evidence of wet crocking?, is there evidence of dry crocking?, is there bleeding of the medium on the quilt surface?, is there bleeding of the medium through to the backing?, is the medium within the design lines?, does the medium effect the fabric's hand?, etc...

Judges are always intrigued by the unique handling of a technique and will base their judging on the resulting quality evidenced in the quilt. If a quilt show sponsor has included degree of difficulty and complexity of design into the evaluation process this unique handling would be recognized. Not having mastered a particular technique does not disqualify a judge from evaluating the success of the technique, as the final result is what is being judged, not how the quilter managed to achieve it.
