





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QUILTER'S QUESTION ...

Here are many stash storing ideas submitted in response to the question *"HOW DO YOU STORE YOUR STASH?"*



Being a relatively new quilter, I probably do not have as big a stash as most, though I still have a closet full. I enthusiastically built up my collection sometimes just buying fabrics that caught my eye and other times for specific projects. I took a class with Weeks Ringle last June, and working with her hand outs and book, I was convinced that organizing by color was the best way to get a handle on what I had. I also decided that my garment making habit of always washing my fabrics was so ingrained that I washed everything before organizing. It was a great exercise – it took two days, but by the end I really was connected to my stash and achieved a better understanding of Tone and Hue, etc. I also became more aware of "who I am" in fabric – what attracts me and what I like is where I have settled. I am my stash??? I have limited funds and limited space – which makes me very aware of the value of my space and the need to work with only what is available...I also have a closet with a yarn stash and am determined not to turn the living space we have into storage. SO – once I had my stash organized by color, I went off to the Container Store for their least expensive containers. I bought a couple of different sizes based on how much space each color category needed – they are clear so I can see what is in them (I now have decided that the large ones are too unwieldy and stick to medium) they stack very nicely and fit into my cupboard space. I also have separate containers for fabric for specific projects - this also helps me remember what I have to work on! Now all my fabrics are washed and folded and sorted. I press them when I use them. I have a container set aside for "good size" scraps and toss things in there as I work - and a container for finished squares or strips that are left over or extras - Lord knows what I will do with them but it is also time I made some "comfort quilts" so... Since I did all this, I find that I can keep my space more organized and find what I need much quicker with the exception of a quilt I am making for a great-nephew that recently announced his wedding plans, I am making the year 2022 the "Year for Working With What I Have" - we'll see how that works -I am doing that with my yarn also! It will be fun to see what I come up with! Jane Kratsch

I recently reorganized my stash as Ryco closed and I acquired a lot of unplanned fabric and the carboards that bolts are wrapped onto. Fabric is sorted by size: 1 yard or more, 1/2 yard, fat quarters/jelly rolls. In each size grouping the fabrics are folded onto cardboards and stacked in large plastic file buckets in color sequence. There is one bucket for "strips and squares" that includes remainder strips from binding, a variety of HSTs created from corners cut from stitch-and-flip, a variety of odd sizes that are the remainders that are too small to fit into the above categories. Some day it will be a crazy, scrappy quilt.

Myra Paul

Here's my system: I use the flat cardboard card from Ryco's on which lace and trims were stored (a bit of nostalgia here) to fold my stash into similar sizes then stack them on shelves in a cabinet, roughly sorted by size then color. The cabinet protects them from sun and dust. Pieces that are not big enough to be folded get stored in a drawer cart, sorted by color with strips going in the back of the drawer. I found the cart on clearance at Home Goods. Everything is easy to find but I just need to stay disciplined enough to put everything back after each project! Pieces that are too tiny to reuse get tossed into a small bin near my machine to be used as leaders and enders.

Nicole Christie

I don't have a very good system. Some of my fabric is sorted by color, some by style (batiks, landscape, Christmas, kids), and some is set aside for a particular project I hope to start one day. I have some bins for pre-cuts, and some with recent purchases (in the past 2 years) that I haven't sorted out yet or fabrics I was going to make something with and just haven't put away. My stash is definitely out of control! Joan Potter

I use milk cartons on their side on the shelf of my sewing room closet. Small pieces are in a storage bucket under my sewing machine table. Current projects (2) are on top of my sewing machine table in a small storage box. Design wall has current projects displayed so I can see them all the time. I ordered fabric from Hancock. It was nothing like the picture. So I would not recommend buying fabric on line. Audrey Dellagrotta

Yes, I do have fabric stashed all over my studio, not just to keep that stash looking like it's smaller than it is, but to keep types of fabrics happy sorted with their own kind. My main stash of regular woven cottons are prewashed and dried, then folded and sorted into shade-covered-shelves by the 24 colors of Joen Wolfrom's 3-in-1 Color Tool[™]. As I was organizing this years ago, I found that all the practice with the color tool helped me better identify the hue of each fabric and its undertones and got me thinking more about the use of pure versus toned fabrics to create effect. My batiks are separately sorted as I tend to use them together in a project rather than mixing them in with regular cottons. I also have novelty prints separated and then there's my treasured collection of stripes which I love to use in a bias binding or in a piping. A small collection of silks, some lames, hand dyes, a few drawers of solids, and a dresser full of backings round out my stash, so needless to say I probably don't need to go shopping anytime soon! My philosophy about fabric stashes is that we quilters receive as much joy from the collecting of fabrics and the memories attached as we do in the use of fabrics in a quilt. So... it's all good!

I don't cut strips into smaller pieces, because I make a lot of log cabin blocks/quilts. Pieces less than a fat quarter are stored by color, not size. I also like to make my own charm packs by making 5" squares with my Accuquilt. When I see that things are getting out of control, I make a nice big, scrappy quilt. Every piece is a remembrance of quilts gone by! And I am not afraid to throw things out. Do I really need that 1" square? **Paula Weston**

The activity mats are designed to safely stimulate and soothe people with Alzheimer's and other cognitive challenges, while providing a better quality of **LIFE**.....

- L Lift spirits and entertain users while relieving caregivers.
- I Interest users in items on the mat. This stimulates senses and reinforces memory.
- F Focus user's attention during therapy or conversation with a caregiver. Helps visitors and staff find topics of conversation with users.
- E Exercise hands and fingers.

So, I hope you will join me in this challenge. I appreciate your support in this worthwhile cause, and can not wait to see what you all will be making.
