


The May 19th meeting will also be our *Strawberry Social* and election of officers.

Unmarked – Contemporary Walking Foot Quilting Workshop

Saturday, January 21st and 28th
9am - Noon EST





You can do so much innovative quilting JUST with your walking foot! Marge will show us her method of quilting with your walking foot that involves little or no marking but still results in spectacular quilting.

Marge will start with the basics, such as batting choices, thread, needles and how to secure the quilting stitches. Then, we start quilting with straight lines and move to curved quilting lines and spirals on your practice quilt sandwiches. For both the straight line and curved quilting, she will show us many designs and variations we can use to great effect. Marge will also have some of her quilts as examples, including "Burst" which received the award Best Machine Quilting (Frameless) at QuiltCon 2019. This class will change the way you think about your walking foot!

SPECIAL PROGRAM OFFERING

Brita Nelson - Making Magic, a Disappearing Block Sampler Quilt





This 6 hour workshop, (2) 3 hour days, will be structured similar to a "sew along." There are 9 blocks and Brita will teach each one in turn. She will have 2 cameras, one on her and the sewing machine, and one pointing straight down at the cutting mat and pressing surface. Brita will demonstrate how to make the block along with little tips on accurate piecing and pressing. Students will then follow along and take turns showing the class how their block came out. The Zoom feature allows Brita to answer questions immediately and help anyone who might be having a little trouble. As some students finish before others, she will show other possible layouts and talk about things like how to enlarge the pattern, or use different colors and how these blocks might look in a finished quilt.

Depending on total participants the cost (\$650) will be divided evenly per student. For example, if we have 20 participants, the cost per student will be \$32.50.

The class will be scheduled over two Saturdays in February 2023. Space is limited to 20 participants. If you are interested in taking this class, please contact Carol Ann Robertson at quiltersbytheseari@gmail.com.

She also has other tutorials which seem to be good. Watch the tutorial and download Zoom prior to our meeting. That way you will be able to just click the link in the meeting invitation that you will receive from NBQA on the meeting night.

Please use your full name when setting up your account, or when asking to be admitted to a Zoom meeting. We check the names against our paid membership list before admitting you into our Zoom meetings. This extra step on your part will help us keep unwanted visitors from "crashing" our meetings. Remember, your membership fee has paid for the Zoom account and any speakers we have this year, so please don't share our invitation emails with non-members, or post the link on any public social media account you may have. This is a primary benefit of membership this year!

QUILTERS QUESTION: Do you sell your quilts? Or do you keep them or give them away? If you do sell them, how do you go about it?

Our guild has some very generous quilters. Merri Giorno and Rosalie Allgair keep some and give some away. Lisa Waterman, Carol Schneider, Patricia Cole and Diane Roman give most if not all of theirs away. Phyllis Cayer gives them to Hasbro and Hospice charities.

Roxanne Williams...I love to give my quilts away. I love the feeling of seeing the joy on the recipient's face...that is worth more than money. It warms my heart. And I also make rope bowls and I fill them up and make sympathy baskets and Birthday baskets. They are so well received.

Lucinda Cory... I make small quilts and give them to my neighbor, who works at the hospital, and to another neighbor who has a clinic in Central Falls. I sleep under 3 in the winter, as do my friends and family. Prior to Covid, I used to give a quilt when I was asked for fund-raising donations.

Gail Macera... The last two quilts I made I donated to the Holy Name Society of St. Mary's Church. The monies made from the raffle will go to making repairs to the church. I have also donated a quilt to the Alzheimer Center in Cranston as well as three quilts to the MAE organization. I am also in the process of making a quilt for a feisty young lady with down's syndrome who loves wrestling and superheroes. I never charge for my quilts. For me, it's better to give.

Patricia Stark... Have never sold a quilt. Some made with a specific person in mind, the rest are given away (like when someone really likes one, they get it), keep the rest. A few end up on the bed or couch.

Kasia Kidd...I keep them or give them away. All of my nieces and nephews have a baby quilt I made for them. Three of my siblings got a quilt when they married. Those quilts were made with help from my mother, grandmother, aunt and cousin. I've only sold 1 quilt; that was over 30 years ago and I don't remember what I charged for it. That was a hand tied log cabin 40 inches square. I hand pieced most of the quilts I've made and usually quilt by hand. I have no idea how I would assign a value to one of my quilts.

Barbara Hartford... I make my quilts for my own artistic creativity...to give to my family and friends, and for charity. Though I have been asked to sell a couple of my quilts, (and asked to make /would like to commission a quilt) I would rather give to those that I know would love them as much as I do. There are so many patterns out there that I want to sew together, but will probably never live long enough... and those that I would like to create/design myself.

Lisa Bagian... Do I sell my quilts?!!!!! I just can't get myself to do it!! It's like asking me "would you sell your kids?" I'm way too attached to my quilts! I have most of my quilts hanging all over my house!! I'm very attached to them. Now if someone approached me and said, 'I like this quilt would you make it?' maybe... but then I wouldn't know how much to charge them? How much would you sell them for? That's another question to think about? Anyone that is not a quilter doesn't know how much work that goes into making a quilt!! So to answer your question No I don't sell my quilts!!!

Linda Maslanka... Now that I have so many great quilts to enjoy, comfort quilts is my favorite way to quilt and share with less fortunate folks. They are always well received and appreciated.

QUILTER'S QUESTION CONTINUED

Myra Paull... I have not had occasion to sell a quilt. I make them as gifts for a particular occasion (wedding, baby, holiday, etc.) and thus, give them away.

Natalie Fleischer...My quilts are given away to people who are special to me. So much goes into each one...that love and warmth is my gift to someone who has gifted me friendship and joy!

Lynn Medeiros... Years ago when I quilted, I gave the finished quilts to family. Now that I have started to quilt again I will give to family or the Comfort Quilt program.

And NOW, someone who actually does sell her quilts.....

Blaire Gagnon... Yes, I do sell my quilts. Mostly word of mouth. I sell completed quilts and do custom jobs. I do have a Facebook page for my business, *A Link in a Chain Quilting*, where I send people who want to see some of my work. Because I have the new longarm, I am considering an Esty shop, a website or something else. I rarely give quilts away, and usually only to family or close friends.

Timna Tarr's **Mass Maples** (used with permission). For this quilt we need 287 classic maple leaf blocks,. Finished size is 4 1/2". The stem portion is paper pieced. The pattern was previously published in the Oct/Nov 2014 issue of *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Colors

Please use complementary colors for the leaf and background fabrics, including secondary and tertiary colors. Complementary colors are opposed to each other on the color wheel. Secondary colors are: orange, purple and green. Tertiary colors are the colors between the primary and secondary colors: red-orange, yellow-green, blueviolet, etc. You can Google "color wheel" if you don't have one, to see which colors are complementary. Please make 4 or more blocks using different color combinations, and feel free to get creative. Any leftover blocks will be used to make mug mats for the next quilt show.

Block Construction

For each block, cut (1) 2" square of background fabric, and (3) 2" squares of leaf fabric. Cut (2) 2 3/8" squares of background fabric and (2) 2 3/8" squares of leaf fabric for the half square triangles. Layer (1) 2 3/8" square of background fabric over (1) 2 3/8" square of leaf fabric right sides together. Draw a diagonal line corner to corner, then stitch 1/4" away from both sides of the diagonal line. Cut in half along the line, and press open, with seam allowance towards the dark side. Repeat to make 4 half square triangles.

Draft a pattern for the stem. Draw a 2" square. Draw a line diagonally across the center, then draw a line 1/8" from each side. Erase or ignore the center diagonal line. The 1/4" section down the middle is the stem, and the triangles on each side are the background. Label the stem piece 1, and the triangles piece 2 and 3. To construct the stem square using the David Sirota method, crease the paper toward you (pattern facing right side up) along the lines between 1 and 2 and 2 and 3. Cut a 3/4" x 3 1/4" rectangle of leaf fabric. On the back of the pattern, center the stem piece over the area for piece 1, right side up, wrong side towards the paper. Pin in place or use a small dot of a glue stick to hold it. Fold back the paper along the crease between piece 1 and piece 2. Align the background fabric right sides together with the raw edge of piece 1. Make sure you have at least 1/4" seam allowance, and that piece 2 is completely covered by the background fabric, then stitch along the crease, all the way to the edge of piece 1. Open up the paper and fold the background fabric open. Press the seam and trim the background fabric generously around piece 2. Secure piece 2 in place with a pin or dot of glue stick. Repeat steps for piece 3, again using the background fabric. Using a rotary cutter and ruler, trim the square along the paper edge to 2" square. Remove the paper. You can use the same paper to piece additional blocks.

Assemble the Maple Leaf Block according to the diagram. Block should measure 5" square with the seam allowance.
